

ASSISTING NATIONALS AFFECTED BY CRISES ABROAD

AN E-LEARNING COURSE FOR FOREIGN SERVICE STAFF

WHY THIS COURSE

In today's increasingly interconnected and mobile world, more people are moving abroad than ever before in history. Migrant workers and their families, international students, business travelers, and tourists from all countries in the world live and work in, and travel to, increasingly distant and diverse destinations.

As a consequence of this trend, the role of home countries' foreign services in providing nationals abroad with travel advide, documentation and assistance is becoming increasingly important. Growing international mobility and presence of nationals abroad, however, increases demand for such services and can overstretch these institutions' capacity to work effectively.

This may be especially the case when the country in which nationals are staying is affected by a crisis such as a natural disaster or a conflict. Support and assistance by foreign services and other relevant home country institutions is essential to guaranteeing the safety of nationals in crises areas. Improving these institutions' preparedness to crises is essential to ensure that they can cope with the intense demand of assistance by their nationals.

In order to enhance the ability of relevant personnel to manage crises that may affect nationals living, working or travelling abroad, IOM, in collaboration with foreign services of various of its Member States, has developed an e-learning course on "Improving assistance to nationals affected by crises abroad".

THE MICIC GUIDELINES

The Migrants in Countries in Crisis (MICIC) Initiative was launched in 2014 as a government-led effort with the aim to improve the protection of migrants when the countries in which they live, work, study, transit, or travel experience a conflict or natural disaster. Through a consultative process that included governments and non-governmental actors in all regions of the world, the Initiative developed a set of Guidelines to Protect Migrants in Countries Experiencing Conflict or Natural Disaster.

The Guidelines are a non-binding document aiming to inform and guide actions by State institutions, civil society entities, International Organizations and private sector actors, both in migrants' countries of origin and destination. They provide practical guidance and recommendations on how to prepare for and respond to crises in ways that protect and empower migrants, leverage their capacities, and help migrants and communities recover from crises.

The Guidelines are complemented by an online repository of practices, which collects relevant experiences, examples of work, tools and lessons learned by a variety of actors all over the world.

THE MICIC E-LEARNING COURSE

Who is the course for?

The course targets consular staff, labour attaches and other personnel of institutions mandated to serve and assist nationals abroad.

What is this course for?

The course provides basic infomation to improve the capacity of relevant personnel to: communicate with nationals abroad before and during crises; directly provide key services and assistance to nationals in the affected area; and facilitate the evacuation of nationals from crisis affected area, if needed.

How can this course be used?

The course is available as a non-country specific curriculum, in English and Spanish. Both versions can be accessed and used at no cost. Since it is an exclusively virtual course, it can easily be used to train personnel in an unlimited number of locations.

Can this course be adapted?

IOM encourages the further translation and adaptation of the course to refect the operational reality and priorities of its partners. To this end, IOM shares the source materials with governmental counterparts, free of charge, and supports their adaptation through targeted research and technical assistance, upon request. Adaptations may include, for instance, complementing existing information to reflect each country's relevant institutions, capacities and systems, including case studies that are more relevant to the contexts in which the country's nationals concentrate. modifying its graphic identity.
